At the time of writing, the mood in Hong Kong is gradually turning more positive with social distancing measures being more relaxed. One major issue that the Government has been promoting is of vaccination rates being linked to the ability of F&B operations being able to open up with less restrictions. Naturally we are closely following developments on this but at present the level of vaccination take up is very low and it is unclear as to how and whether this will change.

I would like to take the opportunity to remind Members of the Car Parking Bye-laws and in particular the reference to "Family" members being able touse the registered vehicle to park at the Club. "Family" members are your immediate family who are registered under your membership, i.e. you(the Member), your Spouse/Partner and your children under the age of 26 who have a Driving Licence. For the sake of clarity, it does not mean your brother or sister, or father or mother (relatives or friends or business colleagues) who are not members of the Club are allowed to use your car to park in the Club and then go elsewhere. Regretfully, we have had some recent incidents of this nature which have been captured on CCTV and recorded by Security and where Disciplinary action has been taken against the concerned member(s).

On a happier note, I am delighted to share the news that the Hong Kong Council of Social Services (HKCSS) has awarded the **5 Years Plus Caring Company Logo** to the Club, in recognition of our commitment in Caring for the Community, employees and the environment over the past 5 years. The Club has been awarded the logo for **5 consecutive years**.

The Caring Company Scheme aims to foster strategic partnerships between the business and social services sectors to create a more inclusive society. This award is given to companies who have demonstrated good corporate citizenship, recognized the concept of corporate social responsibility, and taken up the responsibility to care for the community.





ameron may be the better known of the two to Club members; his dad, Russell was head coach for his age group through the minis and indeed at junior soccer too. Cameron actually started his rugby career for the wrong team, Stanley Fort, which he joined at the age of 3, before seeing the light and moving to HKFC. He played minis at HKFC from U5's to U12's and had a year with the Colts at U13's, before moving to Strathallan School, in Perthshire, Scotland, with whom he won the Scottish School's Cup. He was a regular in the New Year's Day Youth Tournament games at the Football Club. Cameron joined Glasgow Warriors after school in 2017 as a Scottish Rugby Academy player. Cameron won caps for Scotland at U18 and U20 level including in a record-breaking win over Wales in the U20's 6 Nations and went on to tour with Scotland for the 2019 World Rugby U20's Championship in Argentina.

Shortly after that tournament Cameron was signed on a pro contract with Leicester Tigers. He made his senior Leicester debut in a home game against Bath last season and scored a try in his next game, against Gloucester. Two weeks later, he marked his first Premiership start with a try at Wasps. Formerly at the French International School in Hong Kong, Cameron is now 21 years old and 6' 7" and is developing quickly amongst fierce competition in the second row at Leicester where he has won 12 caps to date.

While Cameron was plying his trade at school in Scotland, Dan John arrived in Hong Kong in 2017 at the age of 15 when he joined HKFC Colts while attending Kellett International School.

Dan played for HKFC up to U19's Colts and Hong Kong U19's before moving to Millfield School in England for sixth form.

Dan played for Wales at U18's, U19's and U20's before earning a 3-year contract commencing at the start of the 2020/21 season with the current European Rugby Champions, Exeter Chiefs. Dan, still only 19, won his first cap against Bristol Bears earlier this year and later came off the bench for his Premiership debut against Leicester Tigers where he played against Cameron. He made his first Premiership start against Gloucester a week later.

Neither boys will forget the support and encouragement given to them by their parents and coaches when they were younger. While Dan has rugby in his blood (he is Welsh after all), like Cameron, he owes a lot of his success to his father, Paul who coaches at HKFC and is the current Hong Kong 7's coach. Dan started playing rugby at Lantwit Fardre RFC in Wales where his dad and grandfather had both played before him. Before coming to Hong Kong, Paul John

won the 2009 Rugby Sevens World Cup as head coach for Wales.

Both Cameron and Dan played football in their early days, Dan winning a place at the Cardiff City Academy where he played from U12 to U15 levels before moving to Hong Kong. This supports the old adage that good footballers make great rugby players. It's never too late to start.

And finally, a word for our many parents, coaches and pro-coaches supporting our young rugby players. One of our Minis parents and coaches, who himself had played rugby for Club and Hong Kong, was asked sometime later how his own kid was doing with his rugby. He replied that he thought his son was "going to make it". When asked what he meant by "make it", he replied that he thought his son would now continue playing rugby after Colts and maybe university and hoped that he would get at least half as much out of rugby at senior level as he himself had done, "that's all I ever wanted to achieve as a mini rugby coach".

THE POSITIVE IMPACT OF SPORT

JESSICA COWAN, U10G

Jessica Cowan is a member of the U10 girls team at HKFC. Sport has had a positive impact on her life and wellbeing. This is her story.

essica is 9 year old and was born in Switzerland. After a brief stint in Scotland, she has called Hong Kong her home since she was 7 months old.

As an infant and small child, Jessica was hospitalised on several occasions due to a high fever and severe head and abdominal pain. After one intense experience and admission at the Queen Mary Hospital when Jessica was 5, she was diagnosed with Common Variable Immunodeficiency (CVID not COVID-19!). CVID is an immune disorder characterized by recurrent infections and low antibody levels, specifically in immunoglobulin (Ig) types IgG, IgM and IgA.

Jessica continues to be under the care of the QMH (who have been fantastic), and attends regular check ups every 3-6 months which involves having bloodwork done and full physical examinations to ensure that she maintains good health.

In addition to CVID, Jessica has recently

been diagnosed with Sever's disease. Sever's disease is a painful condition of the heel that occurs in growing children. It happens when the tendon that attaches to the back of the heel pulls on the growth plate of the bone of the heel.

When she was younger, she would get tired easily, and frequently suffer from head and stomach issues. Over the past 3-4 years though, Jessica's immune system has continued to develop and she has grown so much stronger as a result. This has meant that she now has heaps more energy and she loves being active. Jessica began playing rugby for HKFC when she was 5 years old and has continued ever since. She loves it! She's also a keen dancer and will begin badminton classes after the Easter holidays.

For the Sever's disease, Jess needs to do daily stretches, wear ankle braces for any kind of strenuous physical activity, and ice her ankles at night time to help control the pain and swelling. But even this has not stopped her from being active and maintaining a positive mindset.

JUNIOR SOCCER

LOOPS THE ISLAND FOR CHARITY

From late February to late March this year, Junior Soccer organised the first ever Loop the Island - a virtual run and hike. The aim was to see how many kilometres the Junior Soccer family (players, players' families, coaches and friends) could accumulate and hence how many times we could virtually loop (or circumnavigate) the approximately 60KM Hong Kong Island coastal path.

am Nguyen, Junior Soccer Chairman "During the time we are living through, we know that there is nothing more important than keeping active to help our physical and mental health and Loop the Island was designed to get our community engaged and moving! We also set out to raise awareness of a really important topic for young people in Hong Kong".

Martin Cerullo, Loop the Island organiser and head coach of U14 Girls, adds "We wanted to connect Loop the Island to a really meaningful cause impacting Hong Kong. Mental health in Hong Kong has a long history of negative connotation and stigma, experiencing a lack of support and resources. The situation has, in many ways, been worsened by the current pandemic, where the challenges we are all facing are exacerbating mental health issues. We decided to partner with the Kely Support Group and the Weez Project, who both do amazing work to raise awareness of and improve the mental well being of Hong Kong's young people".

Loop the Island started on 26th February with Tony Bruno, the founder of Weez Project and longstanding HKFC member and U18 Coach, doing a solo loop, anticlockwise in 12h58m. A brilliant effort from Tony and a great way to kick off the month! This was then followed by close to 100 Junior Soccer community members joining the HKFC Junior Soccer strava running group and clocking up as many kilometres as they could - running or hiking all across Hong Kong.

Saturday 27th March, the last day of the challenge, started very early for an intrepid group of 14 Junior Soccer coaches and friends. Setting out at 5am from the Yacht Club in Causeway Bay, the plan was to do the loop clockwise, with the challenge of 60Km and 1000M elevation in front of them. Splitting into 3 groups, they set off in great spirits and begun to settle into their pace. Kely Support Group had set up a refreshment and cheering station roughly half way round, which was a very good boost to morale. With the groups sharing their

locations live, the Junior Soccer players were kept updated through the morning with announcements in the stadium and the locations being beamed to the scoreboard. While there were 'moments' for all groups, they fought on in the increasing humidity and heat of the day to smash the challenge!

The first group back completed the loop in a very fast 6h24m, before heading to HKFC for a celebratory lap of the pitch with Junior Soccer players. The second group finished in 8h42m, the first half of the third group in 11 hours and the other half in 12h25m. All rushed to the Sportsman's for some much needed refreshment! Photos from the day are on the Junior Soccer Instagram feed.

Having set out to virtually Loop the Island, the Junior Soccer community in total completed 6206 KM in the month - an incredible 103 loops around Hong Kong Island! The U9 Boys were the top team with 900km closely followed by U14 Girls with 827km. Of the

community members who took part, a special mention for Jenny Lee, U14 Girls parent. As well as covering the most distance in the month racking up over 330 km, she did a full loop solo in under 10 hours in the last week of the month.

At the time of writing, Junior Soccer had raised over HKD 110K for the charities. Tony Bruno shared "Loop the Island has been a fantastic event. It's been brilliant to see the Junior Soccer community get so engaged with and supportive of both the event and raising awareness of mental health."

A great first year for Loop the Island and look out for news as we will be organizing it again in 2022. A big thanks to Tag (www.tagww.com) for the pro bono design of the amazing Loop the Island logo, Wilfred Wong for everything techy, Jenny Lam for the tracking of the KMs, Chris Chan for organizing the shirts and Martin Cerullo for creating and driving the whole event.



The Dinos send their condolences to Cogs and James.





SWIMMING FOR A CAUSE

In January, some of our HKFC swimmers took part in the The 31 Day Swim Challenge, organized by Splash Foundation Co-Founders Simon Holliday and Libby Alexander. In order to raise funds and awareness of their foundation, they had the idea to swim (without a wetsuit) every day in January, to find 31 monthly donors.

In order to raise funds and awareness of their foundation, they had the idea to swim (without a wetsuit) every day in January, to find 31 monthly donors.

Splash Foundation believes that everyone should have an opportunity to learn how to swim. While some people are lucky enough to learn as a child, there are millions of people who face financial or cultural barriers to learning this life skill. Since the foundation was established in 2015, Splash has taught nearly 3,000 children and adults how to swim. It costs just HK\$2,000 to teach someone how to swim and be water safe for life.

The organisation had aimed to teach 5,000 people how to swim by 2020, however, with the recent COVID restrictions in place across all Hong Kong pools and beaches, this target has proven to be somewhat of a challenge for the SPLASH team.

The 31 Day Swim Challenge therefore, was an exciting project. News of the challenge rapidly spread and gathered the interest from many swimmers across Hong Hong, including some ex Olympic Swimmers and Top Hong Kong competitors, all wanting to join the challenge. On New Year's Day, Simon and Libby did their first swim from the jetty at Deep Water Bay with the water a frigid 15 degrees and air



temperature in single figures. The challenge brought them all over Hong Kong, swimming at least one Kilometre a day and sometimes five, and they were joined daily with excited and intrigued guest swimmers.

On Day 27, a delegation from HKFC joined them, assembled by Deb Hanley and led on the day by Alex Fong (Olympic Swimmer). The group swam from Temple Beach, the far side of Repulse Bay, around Middle Island and back - a distance of around 3.5 kilometres. Given the time of year, conditions were challenging, with relatively high winds and cold temperatures. But every member of the team made it back safe and happy.

Over the 31 days, Libby and Simon covered a distance of 100km. But most importantly, and thanks to the generosity of the Hong Kong swimming community, including HKFC members Coach **Dominic Tsui**, **Arthur Li**,

Alex Fong, Deb Hanley, Judy Blaine Marcus, Patrick Ip, Nicolas Gotard, and Matthieu Maury they managed to find 61 monthly donors, and several one-time donors to support the Splash Foundation.

Before the pandemic, Hong Kong Football Club were able to run learn-toswim programmes for the employees of members during off-peak times. Once the Club is back to normal operating hours, we hope to be able to restart programmes of a similar nature. In the meantime, Libby and Simon's intention is that The 31 Day Swim Challenge will be an annual event. Through the organisation, they will continue to strive to create a community where people can build their confidence, improve their health and well-being, and flourish both in and out of the water. THE UNIQUE LIFE OF HENRIK LORENZ ALL HEART, ALL HANDS, ALL-STAR!



Germany vs. Scotland – Penalty Shoot-out

Henrik Lorenz is hanging up his goalkeeper's gloves. There is one last task left for them, those big gloves of his – a penalty shoot-out with Walter Gerrard. A rematch. No midnight debacle, not this time.

On Saturday evening, 10 April 1993, Henrik is hosting a slap-up, all-in 'do' after his testimonial match, German All-Stars vs. Club, to mark his official retirement from 'competitive' soccer. It is the moment for revenge. Henrik checks the faces in the Sportsman's Bar, closes in on Walter, sets out the het

It is the second such bet; the other time the prize was two bottles of champagne. In the glare of the Club floodlights, hurriedly switched on at midnight for that earlier penalty shootout, Walter's challenge was to put two strikes out of three past Henrik to win the bubbly. That time the goalie dug the ball out of the back of the net, not twice but thrice. Ja, midnight debacle.

Not this time. And no lolly-water wager this time, either. Henrik has a real bet in mind. "If you get three out of five past me, I will make a generous donation to charity." (Walter's recall has it in six figures.) They shake.

Henrik heads off to don his kit. Walter presents himself on the penalty spot in a disguise that includes a kilt, so as not to make identification too hard for Henrik. They crouch. High Noon under the Club floodlights.

Henrik saves two of the first four, can't handle the other two. The fifth is a curling laser – into the corner of the net. Charity wins 3-2. The losing goalkeeper, with a giant smile and a flourish, signs the cheque.

That was Henrik Lorenz – a man whose heart was bigger than his hands. No heart, in fact, could be bigger. As for his hands, his big gloves on or off, they were lent to a worthy cause with no hesitation.

tall man was Henrik, hard to miss even in a crowd. He kept his sand-blonde hair long and stylish, his blue eyes alight with wit and intellect. At the Club he would be in either a snappy business suit or a jacket and slacks, or soccer kit. Waving, greeting all and sundry, pumping flesh, taking on the chin the banter from English mates who never dared let him forget their victories in 1918, 1945 and 1966 (only one had anything to do with soccer), and giving it back as barbed as he could get away with... someone had arrived in the Sportsman's Bar. It was Henrik Lorenz. But, how had he got there?

His mother wanted him to be a doctor, a lawyer, a concert pianist, anything but a soccerplayer. "Football is for the working classes!" she berated him, his ear crushed between her thumb and forefinger as she dragged him away from the makeshift goal he had been guarding on some neighbourhood strasse. It would, his partner Sue Li is convinced. have made Henrik the boy love the game more, have had him sneaking out more cleverly to play it.

...to the crush of Carnavon Road, Tsimshatsui. This is the Astor Hotel in 1970 – Henrik's first 'home' on arrival that year. The Vietnam War was still flying US and Australian servicemen to Hong Kong on R&R leave, hence the proliferation of bars, etc.

IDYLLIC CHARACTER

He was born in March 1943 in Neuern, in the Sudetenland - which in 1938 had been the part of Czechoslovakia handed to Hitler by the appeasing Allies at Munich, not far away. The family, to escape the Soviets, moved in 1945 to Bavaria where they were regarded as outsiders. Henrik grew up in Kitzingen and graduated from college in Murnau where he read Economics. Both communities share an idyllic part of the world with blue crystalline lakes and the snow-capped Bavarian Alps. How could a young man quit such landscape for a concrete jungle on the far side of the globe? Only others who have been trapped by the lifestyle magnet that is Hong Kong would understand.

The environment in which Henrik grew up perhaps influenced his own 'idyllic' character. In his early twenties he spent 18 months in the UK learning English, then at 25 ventured farther away, to South Africa where he did 'various work' for a year or two. He went back to Germany reluctantly, determined to get a career going in some other distant part of the world. He wrote himself up in concise terms and inserted a 'position wanted' classified in the newspaper. Keen to work overseas! it would have declared. Somebody saw it.

POOR MAN'S MARKET TO PROSPERITY HOUSE

Henrik touched down in Hong Kong in September 1970, aged 27, with HK\$2,000 'and a small suitcase,' to open a buying office for the German mail-order firm founded by Friedrich Schwab in the 1950s. He checked into the Astor Hotel on Carnarvon Road, Tsimshatsui, then moved to a small flat in Temple Street, right by the Poor Man's Market. His challenge was to learn, fast, the business of sourcing and

exporting of textiles and garments to Germany. He did the learning on his

feet, travelling the region. He went to the Trade Fair in Guangzhou when China was a pioneer's market emerging from the internecine chaos of the Cultural Revolution. His wish had come true – he was working in foreign lands, more foreign lands than he could have imagined, and working hard.

In 1976, Schwab was taken over by Otto Versand. Suddenly Henrik had a new boss. It was time, he decided, to get out on his own. Henrik Lorenz Ltd. started from an office in Prosperity House, Granville Road, TST, and never looked back. "Henrik was a born entrepreneur," nods Wing Cheung, a close friend since the early 1970s. "Hong Kong was the perfect place for him. He had so much energy that building a successful business without sacrificing any passion for football was no problem." Henrik joined the HKFC right after showing up there in season 1970-71. On training night he walked

to the net, claimed the goalkeeper's spot, and impressed enough to soon work himself into the 1st XI. It did not take long, either, for him to start working himself into a legend. The best stories about Henrik in front of the Club goal date from the 1970s.

"DON'T LET HIM SHOOT!"

Wing Cheung tells one: Henrik was the 1st team keeper and the Club had lost every game in the HKFA 1st Division. We were relegated well before the last game of the season. The only honour to play for in that last game was to try to keep the goals against for the season to less

than 100. (97 before the match.) Henrik had another outstanding game, keeping the score to 2-0 with minutes remaining. Then he made the save of the season when our own 'Irish full back' let loose a swing that had the ball going to the top corner. At the final whistle the team celebrated as if it had won the FA Cup. Henrik later said that he was elected the best keeper in the league that season by one of the local Chinese newspapers – as translated, he says, to him by one of his work colleagues. Nobody else ever saw this article.

Mike Bentley, too, has a stock of Lorenz folklore; this is his favourite: The SCMP headline read something like BIGGEST SCORE IN HK FOOTBALL HISTORY! I played that game (obviously ineffectively). It was at Club, against South China, in front of a good crowd. The final score was something like 10-0. My abiding memory is of a traumatised Henrik screaming at the Team whenever Wong Man Wai got the ball: "Don't

let him shoot! Do NOT let him shoot!" That would have been fine, except the screaming started when Wong took possession near the Half Way Line! From there even Pele would have had trouble scoring.

ALL-STARS AND SOCCER 7S

1976 was Henrik's watershed year for more than his business independence. In season 1976-77 he, Wing Cheung and Ian Findlay persuaded the HKFA to set up the Yau Yee (Amateur) League. Henrik's motives included an ulterior one - the German All-Stars, his first entrepreneurial soccer venture. The All-Stars were his team, competing in the new league he had helped conceive - all serious stuff to Henrik, as Mike Bentley can testify: Henrik's motivational technique was to inspire his troops by being the underdog. In the 1980s he managed and played for the German All-Stars against my side, the Club 3rd team at Club. Before the game he was shouting at his players locked inside the dressing room. I pressed my ear to the door. "Today we play the mighty Hong Kong Football Club!" (It was in English as there were few actual Germans in the XI.) "They are top of the league, they are younger, they are faster, they are fitter and stronger than us, and they are more skilful and better. But we shall keep running, never give up, keep tackling, and we shall overcome them and WIN!" The All-Stars ran out shaking, looking terrified. Result: a crushing victory for the Club team!

It took a while for Henrik to mould his All-Stars into match-winners: in 1989-90 they won 'the League title (and) the Challenge Cup.' He then shepherded his charges to the annual 7-a-side tournament at the Singapore Cricket Club. His tourists were a mix of Club players, HKFA pros and a veteran or three from the European premier leagues - the entire tab picked up by Henrik. Not simply a soccer entrepreneur, he was a fully-self-financing soccer entrepreneur. HKFC's Soccer 7s was spawned by the SCC example which focused, as far as invited players went, on retired masters. Tony Bratsanos - having toured for Club to Singapore and being HKFC Soccer Section Chairman - stirred up support for a 7s tournament in Hong Kong, one with a difference. International youth teams, as well as veterans, would be invited.

BEYOND THE PITCH

The inaugural HKFC Soccer 7s was staged at the Club in May 1999. Though an immediate success, the tournament's annual perpetuation was in doubt, until Henrik Lorenz increased his involvement. "If not for Henrik and his Lorenz All-Stars," Tony admits, "our tournament

would have failed." Henrik subsidised the 7s 'out of his own pocket,' flying in Jurgen Klinsmann, Gordon Strachan, Alan Kennedy and other immortals. Today, after ten tournaments, Tony Bratsanos is convinced the HKFC Soccer 7s is the best in the world.

Despite that 'retirement' of his in April 1993, Henrik continued 'competitive' goalkeeping 'up to his last tournament in Phuket' (a month before he died). By then his philanthropy had grown beyond the soccer pitch. Sue Li recalls: Henrik always said Hong Kong had been so good to him and he wanted to give something back. He started helping individuals in China and Hong Kong, and in Thailand after the Tsunami (in 2004). His plan was to concentrate on charity (work) once he found a successor for his business. The institutions he helped set up included an orphanage in Nepal, and the Phuket Youth Football Home 'for under-privileged children from all over Thailand.' In 2005, Henrik was voted an HKFC Life Member. He passed away in his sleep on 16 December 2006, on a flight from Hong Kong to Sydney. Wing Cheung was at the airport to meet him. DVT, with complications, was the cause. He was 63.

LIFE MEMBER

Henrik's Last Will is a statement typical of the man. It instructs the executors to maintain and finance his charitable institutions in Nepal and Thailand until 2106. Says Tony Bratsanos: "Everyone wanted to do something when word came that Henrik had died." Hands, Henrik-style, reached out to help arrange his funeral and settle his affairs. 'Henrik had built a mountain of goodwill. He was a man, a Club character, of the rarest kind.' He is not seen or heard in the Sportman's Bar these days. But he is there. If anyone is a Life Member, it is Henrik Lorenz.


1966 AND ALL THAT

This unused ticket for the 1966 World Cup Group 1 (England, France, Mexico and Uruguay) match at Wembley Stadium on 19 July bears the autographs of every member of the victorious England side – 4-2 victors over West Germany in extra time in the Final. It is a rare item of world soccer memorabilia

The autographing started at the 1991 Singapore seven-a-side tournament, when Clubman Brian McIntyre took a veteran HKFC squad to the SCC which included 'Charlton / Hurst / Peters / Banks / Hunt,' and his brother Tony brought from Canada his ticket-stubs from four of England's matches in 1966, plus this ticket. 'Bobby Moore could not come on that trip,' writes Brian who inherited the memorabilia, 'but he kindly signed them for me and then Alan Ball got the rest of the '66 team to sign the tickets when they all met up for their golfing weekend which was in 1992.'

The four stubs have been on exhibition at the National Football Museum, Preston, England. This fifth ticket, which was given specially to Henrik Lorenz and has been graciously donated to the HKFC in his memory, is itself exhibited outside the Sportsman's Bar.

It bears the signatures of Bobby Moore (Captain), Alan Ball, Gordon Banks, Bobby Charlton, Jackie Charlton, George Cohen, Roger Hunt, Geoff Hurst (who scored a hat-trick), Martin Peters, Nobby Stiles and Ray Wilson.




