# The hills are alive with the sound of Vandals

itting in the shade, the children watched as a gang of giants shuffled on to the mud pitch in front of their school in Nonghet Tai. The pale giants blinked in the afternoon sunlight, conferred in their strange language and then fanned out into a line, facing the children who had come in from mountainous villages for a day of tag rugby. And then they began to sing: "Where it began / I can't begin to knowin' / But then I know it's going strong."

The Vandals visited Laos in early April as part of their mission to support those bringing rugby to some of the most underprivileged people in Asia, play a little rugby themselves and enjoy visiting some of the region's less well known corners. Singing was also at the heart of Laos 2014, as the children of Nonghet Tai (and passengers at the domestic terminal of Vientiane Airport) will testify.

Mr. Virayouth Rathikoun, Laos Rugby

Federation (LRF) President, played against the HKFC Vandals when they toured Laos last in 1974 and commented on the 2014 tour:

"From offering great competition for the Laos Men's National Team hopefuls to training up the next generation of rugby stars at the grassroots level, the Vandals tour was a unique and beneficial opportunity for Laos Rugby and its growing player base. Celebrating the International Day of Sport for Development and Peace with an international cultural exchange really showed the power of rugby to cross borders and inspire players from both sides and we hope the relationship between HKFC and Laos Rugby will remain strong far into the future."

This year, Vandals supremo **Sean** "Gandalf" Purdie formed an alliance with the **Laos Rugby** Federation and ChildFund Australia, enabling the Vandals help out with a phenomenal project that is bringing rugby to children in beautiful, remote Xieng Khouang Province.



The Ho Chi Minh trail (now known as the **Gaz** "Ferret" Wilde trail) runs through this area and unexploded bombs dropped by the US Air Force during the Vietnam War still pose a daily threat to villagers, on top of problems associated with sanitation, poor education and alcohol and drugs.

It was a privilege for the Vandals to be involved for a day with an initiative that enables children in this area to enjoy all the benefits of playing rugby. The Vandals coached teams from different villages, developing a fiercely partisan commitment to places whose names they could rarely pronounce. Tourists also refereed matches with varying degrees of proficiency. It was a strange sight to see rugby played under the mountains in rural Laos, but the kids'

enthusiasm for the game was amazing.

After volunteering in Xieng Khouang Province, the Vandals

returned to Vientiane to take on two of the capital city's club sides. Drawing heavily on a large squad in the heat, the Vandals were forced to work hard to overcome both the Buffaloes and Wild Hogs in a triangular tournament played on a pitch of apparently infinite width.

Horse "Mean Pony" and Richard
"Angry"Sharpe provided some notable
go-forward; Gordon "Ferret Whisperer"
Marsden capped a memorable tour with a fine
performance in both matches; Steve "Special"

He was also tormented by smaller gentlemen during the fine session later that day.

Several Vandals bravely supplemented the Buffaloes vs Wild Hogs local derby, notably **Ian "Williamson" Morrison**, who offered a short masterclass in the finer points of forward play, including the much-feared 'teapot' technique.

While the Vandals' numbers and experience helped them to victory, the Laos players demonstrated incredible commitment and tenacity, showing that rugby in this country has great potential. The local players also joined the Vandals for a social event later that evening, where two teams from very different backgrounds bonded in the time-honoured fashion of rugby tours the world over.

All the Vandals would like to thank Sean for organizing yet another outstanding tour. We would also like to extend our heartfelt thanks to the indomitable **Megan Knight** of the Laos Rugby Federation, without whom we wouldn't have got very far at all...

## Obituary





Bill and wife Suzie

lifelong rugby player and an avid supporter of HKFC's Rugby Section, our friend William 'Bill' Burgess died recently at the age of 65. A man of many accomplishments, he will be best remembered as a friend and mentor to many. Bill had time for everyone and a story for every occasion.

Bill founded the Sequins in 1990 and was the team's Coach for Life. His attitude to rugby was that there was no point in over-exertion. He said team training was to be discouraged on the basis that it showed a complete lack of faith in one's ability. Bill's teams walked onto the pitch, long before it became fashionable.

Stories of Bill's sporting prowess were legendary. He played for the Scorpions and Contemptibles; in earlier times, the University of Western Australia. Bill played at UWA from 1966 to 1982 and represented Western Australia against Australia's Combined Services at prop in 1973.

Always a passionate and vocal supporter of our game, Bill loved that anything could happen in sport – and he was the kind of man that made things happen, on and off the pitch. As Chairman of the HKFC Rugby Section, Bill helped put the Hong Kong Tens on the global stage. The tournament, now widely regarded as one of the best in the world, was a small regional competition in 1990 when Bill got Carlsberg on board as sponsor and began bringing in the top teams and test players from around the globe.

Bill was also a stalwart in the worst of times. He was very active in the aftermath of the Bali bombings in 2002 and was a catalyst to help set up the Bali Memorial Fund. Bill's last outing as a HKFC veteran was for Contemps against the Pot Belly Pigs in their memorial match for Borneo Nick played in 2009.

"Touring is the essence of rugby," Bill would say. A great tourist, he was the driving force behind the Contemps going to their first Golden Oldies in Perth in 1991 and was a regular at the Cup and

Saucer in Bangkok and the Interport Challenge with SCC. Bill loved touring, not for touring itself but because it was a chance for him to get to know his fellow tourists better. As a lawyer, he filled the role as tour judge with aplomb, fining people for misdemeanors large and small. To appear before Justice Burgess in full flight was a scary thing for the accused, but great fun for those watching from the sidelines.

Bill's work, with Hertz, TNT and DHL, took him all over the world too, with extended stints in Australia, Singapore, the UK and Hong Kong. He made friends everywhere and was at home anywhere.

To coin a favourite phrase of Bill's ... what did the romans ever do for us ...! Well Bill they brought us a great man, a great friend and a great supporter of the Section and the Club and not a bad rugby player.

Our sympathies are with Bill's wife Suzie, daughters Gemma and Anika, his grandchildren Errol and Ned.

## **Bangkok Squash Doubles**



Over the last month we have been refurbishing courts 5, 6 and 7. But this is not just any old refurbishment. This raises the Club as a world leader in providing squash facilities as we are now the largest "all glass" court provider in the world.

Unlike the all glass, temporary courts, that are built at international venues for exhibition matches, our courts have the glass panels mounted on supporting brackets against the side and front walls. Frequently asked question, "Can you see through from court 5 to 6?" No the walls are not see through and they have a slight blue tinge.

Approved by the World Squash Federation for all the top global competitions, the courts are more durable and have a longer life than traditional courts.

They will be completed in time for the PSA and WSA tournaments we are organising, the International 3's and the World Masters held in July.

This was the FIRST time the team had a dedicated coaching staff. Not one but three committed people each with their own experience and techniques to bring to the table. There was no doubt **Chris Cooke**, **Ruud de Hart** and **Dickson Wong** had their hands full with a team that had essentially never played together not to mention ladies ranging from 14 to 40+ in age. However, head coach Chris Cooke sees the diversity as an asset and not a challenge, "This is good for the team, having ability and age range differences. The older members help bring on the younger players with their understanding and maturity, with communication etc. Whereas the younger players add enthusiasm, pace and some good skilful play."

Excitingly, this is the FIRST time the women's soccer team has won the HKFA plate and the FIRST time the women's soccer team will have its picture on the walls of the HKFC. After a slow start to the season, a few small losses, a few big losses, ties and just one win, things finally clicked during the plate playoffs. They started off with two huge wins of 5-0 and 7-0 and held on during a hard fought match to secure a tie and the plate, leaving coach Rudd de Hart practically speechless, "Absolutely brilliant, well done ladies, nothing else to say."

On a more social front this was the FIRST time the women's soccer team played in a friendly match against a HKFC men's team, The Rovers. This not only gave the women an opportunity to show off their skills, but it was an opportunity for the women to really feel like part of the Soccer Section. "It was fantastic craic! I think it was a lot of fun for all involved, even for the Rovers who conceded a 4-3 loss... We look forward to it being an annual event and maybe we can convince other teams to play us in coming seasons", says manager Genevieve Burke.

Maybe the women's soccer team didn't finish first in the league, but the other firsts of the season still feel pretty good and everyone is looking forward to creating a few more firsts next season.

## **Golden Memories of the HKFC '517'**

ifteen years ago the Club was a different place. The bar was located in the centre of the Sportsman's, the Section Chairman was **Tony Bratsanos**, **Andy Hunter** played for the 1st Team, **JC** was a match supervisor and the biggest football derby was the 1st Team vs. 517 (2nd team). 517 named after the hotel room number where the team was created only later to become Lucky Mile.

April 1999, the 1st Team are neck and neck with China Fortune at the top of the 2nd Division, 517 are doing an Arsenal hovering around 4th place and with a couple of games to go in the season the 1st derby of 2 in 7 days takes place on a Tuesday night.

In the couple of weeks leading up to the game controversy had taken place as the 1st team demanded the transfer of 517 legend **Foster Wright**, a classy American centre half, to bolster their season run-in...

The day of the big game arrived the 1st Team had one player missing through suspension whose identity will surprise you, the legend that is **Pimmy**...

Anyway to paint the picture of how these games usually go, the 2nd team work hard, threaten with some chances and eventually the quality of the 1st team comes through and victory is theirs.

I played 12 years of derbies and most of them followed this format; the majority were tight contests with the odd thrashing. However on this night the football gods had different plans.

**Andy Dewing** had devised a master plan for the game, 517 would set-up with a 3-5-2 formation...in those days the thought of not playing 4-4-2 or even the word of a different formation was a bit like looking at someone who doesn't have a smart phone these days...

Andy had clearly been planning for this moment for an age, we were all given our roles, with the key role falling to **Phil Shirley** to man mark **Paul Wilkin**. Wilko, at the time, was the best player in the Club and a 30 goals a season striker.

The game was a tightly fought bitter contest...the script we were supposed to follow was to roll over and allow our club mates to get closer to the title... the reality was that we were fighting and looking for a win...Don Taylor was having the game of his life up front, our midfield was on top and Phil Shirley had Wilko in his back pocket...

Then the moment came - Clive Wong smashed the ball into the corner and it was 1-0...I don't ever remember Clive scoring before or after this game and I think he retired at this moment. Clive later advised us in the bar "they should have man marked me".

The 1st team now came with wave after wave of attack searching for that equalizer, with some heroic defending by 517...and, well, it wasn't going to happen as **Don Taylor** scored from the edge of the area 2-0...if there

was a crowd that night they didn't go wild, they all looked shocked. I recall **Don** heading off to the corner flag after scoring, doing his celebration and turning expecting to be dived on by his adoring teammates but...there was no-one within 40 yards of him...the midfield were all still on the halfway line, hands on knees.

The last few minutes were played out with some showboating by 517, the ball was being played out of defence and there were lots of 5-10 yard passes in the midfield. I'd like to think the crowd were shouting "o-lay" but I think it was just the manager and the subs. The master plan had worked and the 2nd team had beaten the 1st team for for the first time in 100 years (so we were advised).

The back page of the Standard newspaper the next day led with the following headline:

## "Club left smarting after historic loss to second stringers"

The following week 517 lost the repeat fixture 2-1 with hastily called up recruit **Tony Sealy** scoring the winner and the 1st team won the league. And of course, not forgetting Foster Wright, the 2nd team's best player never to beat a 1st team, who played on the losing side when 517 won, a source of much amusement for many years to come...

Memories are golden.

The day also marked the end of the Club Indoor Ladder competition, as set up by **Mark Mahoney** while he was Chairman. Bernard asked Mark to present





## On kids training:

I want our junior athletes to enjoy running and to know that running is a lot of fun. I want them to learn proper running form to be able to run injury-free in the future at any age. While training for races and racing, the athletes will learn about discipline, perseverance and self-control.

## **Top coaching tips:**

- Make training fun and safe
- · Listen to athletes
- · Be a good role model

## Any amusing swimming/running stories to share?

I often see really cool wild animals when I run on Hong Kong trails. Monkeys, wild pigs, deer, porcupines, squirrels, buffalos. Instead of going to the zoo, I just go for a run. Being a runner is like having a small vehicle that can take one to amazing places.

## Challenge Taiwan 70.3 -Half Ironman

he race day started early as 400 of the 1,400 participants were doing a full Ironman distance race. The rest of us mere mortals were only doing the half involving a 1.9 km swim, 90 km bike ride and 21km run. So actually we got to sleep in a bit longer as we only had to be at the start line for 6am, instead of 4:30am!

The swim was in a man-made "lake" and we were allowed to wear wetsuits. They said the water temperature was only 24.8 C, but the main reason for the decision to wear wetsuits was made by the professional athletes, because it makes their sponsors happy! Yep, it's all about the money.

The bike was gorgeous, rolling hills with a huge shoulder to ride on. They don't close the road to traffic, but luckily somehow the Taiwanese drivers are so much more tolerant of cyclists than our Hong Kong drivers. For me, I had a good bike ride until I passed two women who decided it was a good idea to sit on my wheel and draft. After trying to drop them, I resigned

myself to pulling them to the finish... it's all part of racing. However one of the women who drafted me on the bike then took off on the run, but I managed to catch her at the 6km mark. She then proceeded to "chat" while we ran even though I said "I need to breath, so I don't talk". "No problem" she said, "I'll talk and you listen!" After another 7km of this, I decided I couldn't take it anymore and let her go. After that it was a much better run although there was a serious lack of markers for the finish line, so I ended up running back and forth trying to find someone who could speak English and tell me where the finish line was, but I found it in the end!

Enough of the problems in my race, the successes were the fact that when I finished I felt like I could turn around and do it again and that I did not end up in the medical tent on an IV drip. I also managed to come first in my age group (45-49) and the 4th woman overall!

# **Boston Marathon**

can say with all sincerity that
Boston was probably the toughest
marathon I've run. I can also say
with all sincerity that it is the best.

Rather than beating around the bush it's probably easier to lay out the facts.

- 36,000 runners (that's nearly 5 times the number of people doing the full marathon for Standard Chartered Hong Kong).
- 1.5 million spectators. It's hard to put that into perspective. I was 5 rows deep for most of the 42.2km
- 4 outlying towns and a major city completely devoted to the event.
- And a race that was a celebration of the spirit of the people not to be swayed in the face of adversity, who rose up and carried themselves with quiet class and dignity rather than brash discrimination.

For the whole week the entire city of Boston was centred around the marathon. There were 5km races for the average Joe to get involved, invitational mile races for the world class elites, kids relays, and of course the marathon.

The town also celebrated with special events and meetings. One of my strongest lasting memories will surely be the non-faith based blessing of the runners. The service included a diverse range of celebrations, from American Gospel to Opera singers to bagpipes, and culminated in a blessing of runners where participants were given a scarf in "Boston Strong" yellow and blue colours that regular people from around the country had hand knitted to thank and support the runners for coming to support the marathon after

the events of last year. Even as a foreigner it was hard not to be moved.

But there was no delaying the inevitable, and there was still a marathon to run.

The day started with a classic yellow school bus convoy from Boston Common to Hopkinton, the start point of the race, and boy did it seem like a long drive out, with every mile driven to be paid back with the return run.

The organisation was amazing, and although there was security it was never obtrusive...

Although I've never done a marathon with Blackhawk helicopter flyovers and SWAT team snipers at strategically placed roof tops before.

To skip the minutiae, the run was very tough. I'd heard about heartbreak hill, the big climb about 20 miles in, but nobody mentioned it's basically a rolling course from the get go, and all those who finished were crippled.

The Wellesley girls were certainly a high point, and likely represent the last chance for us old blokes to kiss a college girl. I figured early on that it was acceptable to kiss a girl holding a sign beckoning for such action. **Richard** seemed oblivious to this wisdom and provided welcome comic relief when he ran over and ingratiated himself with a random girl on the course whose only crime was standing near Wellesley college.

And I think we'd all say the last 10km were very tough. The muscles burned more than is normal, and the hills took

As is normal I crossed the finish line with not another yard of running in me... And it was only seeing Richard 10 metres ahead that stopped me from sitting down right there and then.

It was a tough course but we all held our heads high. I got a personal best (by 30 seconds) with 2.54.40. Richard must have been about 30 seconds ahead. And **Jan, Elaine, Candice** and **Jackie** all put in very strong performances, although I'm not sure of exact times.

But no rest for the wicked, so it's back on the plane to Hong Kong, and time to bring this trip report to a close.

It was an amazing weekend. I always say never again for these races. But this time I'm not so sure. ■

## Choosing the Right Bowling Ball

## 1. Find your ideal ball weight

Some say your ball should be approximately 10% of your body weight, up to the maximum 16 pounds. Most pro bowlers use 16-pound balls, although most use 15-pounders. Another method is to add one or two pounds to the weight of the house ball you normally use. A heavier ball drilled specifically to your hand will seem to weigh about the same as a house ball two pounds lighter.

Even with these guidelines, you should never use a ball too heavy just because you feel you should. The ideal ball weight is the heaviest ball you can comfortably throw.

## 2. Determine your ideal cover stock

The cover stock is the material on the outer surface of the ball, and is very important in determining how your ball will react to the lane conditions. There are four types of cover stocks: polyester (more commonly referred to as plastic), urethane, reactive resin, and particle.

#### 3. Choose your ball

Once you know the weight and cover stock you need, you can find a large number of balls online, or you can ask your local pro shop. There are differences in each category, but a conversation with a pro-shop operator or some online research should be enough to get you the right ball for your game.

You can find a good plastic ball for \$600 or even less. Reactive-resin balls start around \$900 and go up from there, though some, as well as particle balls, may cost \$2,000-\$3,000.

### 4. Get it drilled to fit your hand

You can find pre-drilled bowling balls, but if you're going to use one of those, you might as well save your money and use a house ball. A ball drilled specifically to your hand gives you more control and also significantly decreases the risk of injury. Take your ball to a pro shop and have an expert measure your hand and drill your ball. Some stores will include free drilling with the purchase of a ball, but in other cases, you shouldn't expect to pay more than \$300 for drilling—and it's worth it.

#### 5. Be patient.

When you first hold (and release) a ball drilled to your hand, you might be afraid it doesn't fit. This is because the house balls you're used to don't fit. With a little practice, your new ball will prove to be infinitely more comfortable and controllable than a pre-drilled house ball.

Well done to all that played, thanks for your support. We will squeeze in one more inter-club match before the summer recess, against United Services Recreation Club in late June. More details to follow in due course.


